


## **County Compensation by Industry: Far West Region**

• The Far West region accounted for 18 percent of the nation's total compensation in 2009. Of the 167 counties in the nation with at least \$10 billion in total compensation, 27 were in the Far West region and accounted for 84 percent of the region's total compensation.



In the Far West region in 2009:

• Total compensation declined in 125 of 183 counties. The largest contraction occurred in Crook County, Oregon at -12.5 percent, while the largest growth occurred in Lander County, Nevada at 15.8 percent.

• Declines in construction, durablegoods manufacturing, and professional, scientific, and technical services were the largest contributors to the contraction in total compensation.

• The local government sector accounted for the largest share of total compensation at 11.9 percent.

Metropolitan county compensation

declined in 57 of 73 counties. The largest contraction occurred in Columbia County, Oregon at -9.4 percent, while the largest growth occurred in Benton County, Washington at 8.2 percent. Non-metropolitan county compensation declined in 68 of 110 counties.

• Average annual compensation per job increased in 168 of 183 counties, as a decline in employment more than offset the decrease in compensation. North Slope Borough, Alaska had the highest average compensation at \$101,531, while Wheeler County, Oregon had the lowest average compensation at \$31,124.
